Flu Activity Increases

Where Can I dispose of/recycle Lightbulbs??

Fluorescent bulbs - this type of light source is part of our everyday life. There are three main types of fluorescent lamps: cold cathode, hot cathode, and electroluminescent. Fluorescent lights work by ionizing mercury vapor in a glass tube. This causes electrons in the gas to emit photons at UV frequencies, UV light is then converted into standard visible light by using a phosphor coating on the inside of the tube. (Fascinating huh?) Therefore, all fluorescent lamps, tubes and bulbs contain small quantities of mercury. The mercury is the reason why these types of bulbs **SHOULD NOT be disposed of through our regular trash.**

The EPA mentions recycling prevents the release of mercury into our environment. CFLs and other fluorescent bulbs often break when throw into a dumpster, trash can or compactor, or when they end up in a landfill or incinerator.

SWALCO collects fluorescent bulbs and tubes during our Residential Household Chemical Waste events. You can also check with your local hardware stores or search for mail-back services on the internet.


Incandescent bulbs (plain ole' non-fancy type bulbs!) work by sending electric current through a resistive material. Typically materials will glow before reaching a melting point. Most materials will glow a dull red color when they reach higher temperatures creating thermal radiation or "glow". The filaments and glass holding the electrical current in a fixed state are not recyclable and **can be safety disposed of through your regular trash.**

LED bulbs (light-emitting diodes) are growing in popularity and are known for their efficiency, durability and versatility. LED lighting is different from other lighting sources, the bulbs don't store heat for

one thing, other bulbs types produce heat as a "by-product". The lifespan of LED lighting products is also different from your typical light bulb - LED bulbs don't "burn out", they lose lumen effectiveness or in other words, experience lumen depreciation when the bulb simply doesn't produce the same amount of light.

LED bulbs are a non regulated waste and can be disposed of through your regular trash.

Halogen bulbs are another popular bulb type. Its considered by many "a fancier version of the incandescent bulb". The glass is stronger to keep the increased gas pressure in check. To dispose of a halogen light bulb, you will first need to remove it from the light fixture. Make sure that the bulb is cooled before touching it. These bulbs get **HOT** and can easily cause severe burns if handled incorrectly. Pull gently on the bulb to remove it. Once you have the bulb out, put the used bulb in the packaging of the new replacement bulb. Or wrap it up in newspaper to prevent it from shattering. **Halogen bulbs can be safety disposed of through your regular trash.**

HOLIDAY TREE RECYCLING
 Don't send your Christmas tree to the landfill, drop it off with the Lake County Forest Preserves for recycling.

Donated trees are chipped and used for trails and landscaping at forest preserves throughout Lake County.

Bring your tree to a drop-off site at one of the following forest preserves, open daily from 6:30 am to sunset:

Grant Woods in Fox Lake—drop trees off at Monaville Road entrance, second parking lot.

Greenbelt in Waukegan—drop trees off next to maintenance facility.

Half Day in Vernon Hills—drop trees off next to maintenance facility.

Heron Creek in Long Grove—drop trees off at Shelter A.

Lakewood in Wauconda—drop trees off along Forest Preserve Drive.

Old School in Libertyville—drop trees off near main entrance.

Ryerson Woods in Deerfield—drop trees off at the end of main entrance road.

Van Patten Woods in Wadsworth—drop trees off just past the Shelter A parking area.

Drop-offs accepted at the marked sites only between **December 26 and February 1.**

Only undecorated, real Christmas trees can be accepted; no yard waste. Commercial drop-offs are prohibited

Keeping Pets Safe in Wintry Weather

Not only can winter be a time of illness and injury if people fail to take appropriate health and safety precautions, but harsh winter weather conditions can be tough on pets as well.

Salt and other chemicals used to melt snow and ice can irritate the pads of your pet's feet. Wipe the feet with a damp towel before your pet licks them and irritates its mouth. Trim excess fur from your pet's pads so that ice and snow do not accumulate between its toes which can cause discomfort.

Antifreeze is a deadly poison with a sweet taste, which may attract animals. Wipe up spills and store antifreeze out of reach. If possible, use antifreeze coolant made with propylene glycol. If this is swallowed in small amounts, it will not hurt pets.

Do not allow your dog to run freely on open ice. It can be difficult to judge the safety of the ice, and your dog could be at risk of falling through.

During the winter, it is best to keep your pets inside with the family. The happiest dogs are those that are taken out frequently for walks and exercise, but are kept inside the rest of the time. Dogs and cats crave human companionship and should be indoors with you and your family.

REMINDERS

- ★ **Inoperable Vehicles** - It is a violation of the Village Ordinance to park or store a vehicle which is inoperable or unlicensed in residential driveways.
- ★ **Clear Paths** - As a courtesy to Village residents and guests, property owners are required to trim trees and shrubs that extend into the sidewalks and streets. People should be able to walk on the sidewalks without bumping into them.
- ★ **Building Permits** - If you are unsure whether or not your project requires a building permit, please call the Village Hall for confirmation. Some projects that you may not know need permits include:
 - Hot water heater replacement
 - Air conditioning unit replacement
 - Furnace replacement
 - Interior remodeling
- ★ **Overnight Parking** - There is no parking on Village streets between the hours of 2:00 am and 7:00 am. If you need to leave a car on the street overnight, you must call or email the Village Hall by 2:00 am. Leave a message including your name, address & the vehicle (s) license plate number (s). *** PLEASE DO NOT FORGET TO LEAVE THE LICENSE PLATE NUMBER (S)***
- ★ **Pets and Pet Waste** - Pets are not permitted to roam the Village freely. All pets are required to be leashed when not on the owner's property. Allowing your dog to deposit waste on another resident's property or on Village sidewalks or streets and not picking up the waste is a violation of our Village Ordinance.

★ **Trash & Yard Waste** - Waste Management Guidelines:

All waste materials must be placed out at the curb for collection by 6:00am the day of your collection, but not before 5:00pm the day before your pick-up. **This includes yard waste bags and containers.**

All containers and any solid waste materials that are not collected must be removed from the curb by 8:00am the day after your scheduled collection.

SNOW EVENT ENFORCEMENT

Village Ordinance No. 11-08-05 states that there is no parking of any vehicle on Village streets at any time within 12 hours after a snowfall of ONE INCH or more has occurred.

Village Ordinance No. 10-06-02 states that it is unlawful to interfere with, obstruct or tend to obstruct or render dangerous for passage any street.

These ordinances will be vigorously enforced. Violations will result in the issuance of a \$25.00 fine and / or towed at owner's expense.

Calling in a vehicle left on the road overnight during / after a snowfall of one inch or more will not excuse you from receiving a violation and parking ticket.

Due to the nature of the street layout in Mariner's Cove, the plowing service may unintentionally hit a mailbox or scrape a section of sod near the curb. If this happens, please report the incident to The Village President, Gary Beggan at 847.223.8422 during normal business hours or at gbeggan@sbcglobal.net or 847.223.5105 when the Village Hall is closed. Leave your name, street address and a contact method to facilitate follow-up action.

Please remember to shovel around your fire hydrant also.
